"A long way from the farm"

Sometimes, I feel a very long way from the farm of my youth. April 27th was one of those days.

I negotiated snarled traffic on the Stevenson and Dan Ryan to head to the Cook County building in Chicago. No traffic like that on the farm. A Farm Bureau group from Cook County as well as Illinois Farm Bureau was attending the county board Meeting to present a plaque commending the Cook County Board for approving a sweeping resolution that recognizes and declares the importance of agriculture in Cook County.

I first realized this was going to be "something" of a meeting as I approached the Cook County building that morning on the 27th. Walking by the Daley Center, news trucks were set up and a TV interview was occurring on the sidewalk at the corner of Clark and Randolph. As I entered the County building, a news conference "circus" was in progress by the ground floor entrance. All of this for our proagriculture resolution?

Picking my way around the gawkers, I made my way up to the fifth floor to the county board room. The gallery area was packed...standing room only. Great. That's what I get for running tight on time always – I should know better! Always blame the traffic.

Everyone who crowded in the room must love our resolution!

Starting a few minutes after 10 a.m., President Preckwinkle called the meeting to order and roll call was taken. Public testimony to follow...our time to recognize the county board for passing the agriculture resolution. A quick in and out... I wouldn't have to stand too long!

Oops, check that...First on the agenda, Mdm. Pres. Preckwinkle accepted a motion not to follow the published agenda, postponing the public testimony until later in the meeting. The motion carried.

The county board moved into the important topic of passing a resolution honoring the work, service and success of Commissioner Brandon Johnson as a Cook County Commissioner on his road to becoming the new mayor of Chicago. The room was not packed to celebrate agriculture.

Mayor-elect Johnson was attending and participating in his final Cook County Board of Commissioners meeting on April 27 before heading to the Chicago Mayor's office. I'm guessing he experienced a significant upgrade in his office desk and décor when he moved his nameplate from the county side to the city side of the building. His successful election victory over incumbent Mayor Lightfoot, Paul Vallas and many more was surprising. As a non-Chicago resident, I did not have a vote but like many, I did pay attention to the mayoral election. Chicago's influence throughout the region is undeniable.

A lengthy "Brandon is Awesome" resolution was read by the County Clerk, Karen Yarbrough. This was followed by each of the remaining 16 Cook County Commissioners and many other elected officials (including Congressman Danny Davis and the county clerk) taking the mic for 3-5 minutes to praise, provide personal stories, provide advice, joke and subtly share their vital role in Mr. Johnson successes.

Lovefest and total gushing time by politicians: 1hour, 5 minutes.

Following the "roast" and passage of the resolution, mayor-elect Johnson spoke to those assembled with many platitudes that focused on anticipated transformation towards equity and justice in Chicago.

The Cook County Board of Commissioners collectively seemed to look forward to a quality working relationship with the new Chicago mayor. Apparently, the previous two mayoral administrations have been difficult to work with for the county

Two questions:

- There will be a honeymoon period between the mayor and other local elected powerbrokers. How long will that honeymoon period last?
- Will those on the county board remember all the gushing praise heaped upon the new mayor on April 27 when Chicago and Cook County's leadership interests diverge?

Eventually, public testimony was opened, led off by the colorful figure of George Blakemore (do a search for him if you don't know who he is) and a series of individuals presenting comments and testimony.

I'm a long way from the farm.

Finally, Bona Heinsohn, Cook County Farm Bureau staff leader stepped to the mic and Cook County Farm Bureau was able to properly commend the Cook County Board of Commissioners for approving the agriculture importance resolution. Bona suggested a group photo and I was stunned that they stopped the meeting to gather for a photograph. Of course, all the commissioners wanted to be in the commemorative photo op with CCFB members Ruth Zeldenrust, Amy Hansmann, Bona and me! However, I believe that Mr. Johnson exited the meeting by that point to take care of a mounting pile of important city

Mayor Johnson missed that photo op but I know how he can set up another photo op with his Cook County Farm Bureau friends. I call upon Mayor Brandon Johnson to now pass a proagriculture resolution through the Chicago City Council for one of his first major Chicago policy actions. Politicians like to eat.

Yep. I'm a long way from the farm.

Recipe of the Month JUNE—



Edna's Favorite Broccoli Salad


Edna Nykaza, Ray's Quality Greenhouse

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 med head cauliflower
- 1 med bunch of broccoli
- 5 or 6 green onions
- 1/2 lb bacon, fried crisp and drained
- 1/4 c white vinegar
- 1/2 c granulated sugar
- 1 c Miracle Whip
- Optional: 1/4 c dried cranberries, 1/8 c hulled sunflower seeds


DIRECTIONS:

Separate the cauliflower and broccoli stalks and cut into bite-size pieces. Mix together vinegar, sugar, and Miracle Whip in a separate bowl. Place all vegetables into a large bowl with bacon pieces. Mix liquid ingredients into vegetables and bacon. Refrigerate for several hours or overnight and mix well before serving. Optional: You can add a scant ¼ c cup of dried cranberries for extra flavor and/or about 1/8 cup of hulled sunflower seeds for extra crunch before serving. This is a staple at the Nykaza family Thanksgiving dinners – rest in peace, Edna.

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IAA Foundation Awards \$144,501 in Scholarships to Students Pursuing Agriculture Degrees

Chicago High School for Agricultural Sciences Student Among Recipients

The charitable arm of the Illinois Farm Bureau, the IAA Foundation awarded \$144,501 to 75 students pursuing degrees in agriculture-related fields. Students are selected based on their academic achievements, leadership involvement, professional career goals and overall commitment to success.

"It is a privilege to invest in students who represent a strong and vibrant future and will contribute significantly to agriculture," said Jennifer Smith, Development Manager, IAA Foundation.

Zach Kampwerth of Carlyle, in Clinton county is the Illinois Farm Bureau Legacy of Leadership Scholarship recipient and receives a \$7,500 scholarship for the honor. IAA Foundation Distinguished Scholars Gage Miller of Cambridge, Halie Kohl of Herscher, and David Mock of Galva. each will receive a \$5,000 award. Other scholarships being presented range in value from \$1,000 to \$3,001.

Cook County resident, Jarvis Williams, received \$3001 by being named the first

recipient of the new Sandhu Minority in Agriculture scholarship. Williams attended the Chicago High School for Agricultural Sciences and he is pursuing an Engineering Technology and Management for Agricultural Systems major at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

Sim Sandhu is Director of Strategy & Innovation for the Illinois Farm Bureau Finance Division. Sim created the scholarship for racial minority students from Illinois who are interested in a career in agriculture to help foster an agricultural industry that more closely represents the world it feeds and to ensure the diverse perspectives needed for innovation are accessible.

Annually, the Illinois Farm Bureau and county Farm Bureaus combine to award more than \$1,000,000 in scholarship



Farm Bureau Pollinator Garden Receives Monarch City USA Designation

In May, the Cook County Farm Bureau® Board of Directors approved a resolution for the Farm Bureau to join Monarch City USA. Monarch City USA strongly encourage municipalities and organizations to directly help the monarch butterfly population recover through planting milkweed and nectar plants within their borders.

A portion of the resolution is provided below.

WHEREAS, the monarch's habitat needs are specific; its caterpillars can only survive if they have milkweed, and the adult butterflies need nectaring plants and wildflowers; and

WHEREAS, monarch populations are measured by the total forest area occupied by monarchs over the winter in the oyamel forests of central Mexico, the destination of their 3,000 mile migration; and

WHEREAS, during the 2017-2018 winter season, the total forest area occupied by overwintering monarchs was just over six acres; and

WHEREAS, conservation experts hope to bring the overwintering coverage area to over 15 acres on average, which they believe will result in a sustainable population that can withstand seasonal variations; and

WHEREAS, increasing monarch populations to a sustainable level will require a multi-pronged approach from a variety of stakeholders across the monarch's migration range, including stakeholders in Illinois and Cook County.

NOW, THEREFORE, Cook County Farm Bureau® recognizes the shared responsibility of farmers and others to expand, enhance, protect monarch butterfly habitat; and

NOW, THEREFORE, Cook County Farm Bureau with the assistance of partners has established pollinator habitat, engaged in community and member outreach, and provided pollinator seeds to farmers interested in establishing habitat.

BE IT RESOLVED, Cook County Farm Bureau will continue its efforts to expand, enhance, and protect pollinator and monarch butterfly habitat;

FURTHER RESOLVED, Cook County Farm Bureau Board of Directors wishes to join Monarch City USA, a nonprofit dedicated to helping the monarch butterfly population recover by encouraging and planting milkweed and nectar plants; and

- She is called on daily during the summer to safely remove and relocate Honey Bees, Carpenter Bees, Bumble Bees, and Native Bees. And she provides concerned homeowners with strategies to manage ground wasps, yellowiackets and bald-faced hornets.
- Her business collects and removes swarms of honey bees, raises local queens, promotes bee venom Apitherapy, provides pollination services and produces local honey for sale.
- She is a leading advocate for planting natives, shopping local (farm to table), and aspiring to live a self-sufficient lifestyle. She has nearly 100 colonies of bees across 10 locations in Cook, DuPage, Will, Lasalle and Walworth Counties. Kim is a Director on the Board of the CookDuPage Beekeepers Association.
- Kim has 4 dogs, 2 cats, 2 horses and a small flock of chickens.


WHAT IS A Farmers Market?

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Sunrise, set prominent lure to country living



In her earliest drawings, our daughter frequently sketched the sunset and its brilliant hues, including the shades of pink and purple most don't consider. She would compare anything fiery orange to the daily phenomenon. And since acquiring a cell phone in her teenage years, she takes photos of both the sunrise and sunset, often several times a week. She sends Snaps on Snapchat, pairing her photo with a country song for a poetic start or end to the day for her friends.

Our daughter keeps her eyes on the horizon, one of the wonders of farm and country life. Out here, we can watch the sun arrive and disappear at a horizon of trees and corn fields without obstruction. Seeing the sun touch the earth ranks one of the most common reasons for living out here. At every cloudless sunrise and sunset, we feel unbound and free in peaceful solitude. For me, the daily moments create a direct connection with Mother Nature that amplifies the praise that we vocalize in unison at Sunday worship: God is good. But I would understand if any eastbound drivers heading 20 miles to work around 6 a.m. may disagree.

The sun most often determines the length of the workday, outside of late harvest nights by tractor light. Hunters hunt from dawn to dusk. We start scouting fields at daybreak, expecting the sun's length of exposure and heat to advance the crops.

Farmers look to the horizon to monitor summer storms approach or drift away with their anxiety dependent on the farm's needs.

In contrast, I enjoy visiting the Chicago suburbs, where my sister-in-law thoughtfully schedules experiences with new shops, parks and beautiful urban landscapes. I soak in doses of the city's culture, energy and especially the delicious food with accessibility. But I miss the horizon and the indescribable liberty that brings. Returning home, I look most forward to reconnecting with it

Ironically, a day this weekend started with a friend's meme of a country sunrise on Facebook. By evening, a friend texted me a sunset photo taken near the farm. Among my favorite summer sunrises is when I pull eastward into the driveway of the home farm by 6 a.m. The sun's rays cut through the trees of the pasture and accentuate the fog that hangs low in the river bottom of corn below the farmstead.

In paraphrasing Franklin Roosevelt, we hold to hope and belief in a better life beyond the horizon. I agree as long as we never overlook the good life within it.

Farm Bureau Supports Measures to Improve Access to Fresh Produce

In an effort to ease regulations on urban farms and gardens, Farm Bureau supported measures introduced by the Lightfoot Administration to allow produce stands to remain on farm sites or urban gardens providing those locations sell fresh, uncut and unprocessed produce directly to consumers.

Farm Bureau Urban Agriculture policy supports urban agriculture and recognizes the contributions of urban agriculture to the agricultural economy. The policy specifically supports urban agriculture sites, including urban farms and gardens gaining access to markets and developing the infrastructure to store and sell food. Ordinance 2022-3989 specifically permits produce and farmstands located on urban agricultural sites within the City of Chicago. An Overview of —

County Government in Illinois

Counties are political subdivisions of the state, created by statute to carry out state policy and administer state regulations, services and functions at the local level. The history of Illinois counties has been traced as far back as 1778, when the Illinois territory was first a county before becoming a state in 1818. From that year on, county duties and structure changed with each new state constitution. Today, they change seemingly with every legislative session.

ROLE

In Illinois, counties serve as the primary general purpose local unit of government in unincorporated areas. In that role, counties provide law enforcement, construct and maintain county roads and bridges, provide public health and welfare assistance, conduct elections and adopt an annual budget.

Counties can also provide a large and diverse variety of services and functions. A few of the most common include:

- Providing recreational services, public parks and museums
- Maintaining a public health department
- Engaging in land use planning and zoning
- Providing transportation services
- Operating a senior care facility

Another function of county government is to maintain the property tax system. While each unit of local government is responsible for its own budget, which in many cases is largely funded by property tax dollars, it is the county that calculates levies, distributes tax bills, collects tax dollars and disseminates those dollars to all local units of government within its jurisdiction.

STRUCTURE

Counties have the option to operate under a township form (also referred to as the board form) or a commission form of government. We currently have 85 counties operating under the township form and 17 counties structured under the commission form.

COUNTY BOARD

The Illinois Constitution requires each county to elect a county board. The number of members shall be fixed by ordinance with limitations provided by law. Counties structured under the township form can have five to 29 board members elected at large or by district.

Counties structured under the commission form may have three members elected at large or by district, or five members elected by district. Under this structure, the members are known as commissioners. In both cases, county boards serve as the legislative and executive arm of the county.

As the legislative body, the board has the authority to pass resolutions and adopt ordinances in areas such as land use, zoning, public health and safety and support for agriculture. As the executive body, the board manages county funds and administers activities of many of the county departments and offices.

COUNTYWIDE OFFICIALS

The Illinois Constitution also mandates each county elect a sheriff, county clerk and treasurer.

Counties may also elect or appoint other officials, including a coroner, recorder, assessor and auditor.

county boards to build a greater awareness of Farm Bureau and to lobby said county boards to approve a resolution recognizing and celebrating agriculture in the county.

Since joining the Farm Bureau many years ago, a portion of my duties has been building relationships with county board members. Early on in my tenure I identified commissioners who might be receptive to conversations about Cook County agriculture and Farm Bureau policies. Many were recently elected, suburban or located in a district with a strong link to agriculture.

Some initial meetings were easy to schedule. Some took a little longer. Some were held "on the fly" during walks to or from elevators or off to the side in the boardroom. In the end.

doors were opened and the foundation for lasting relationships was built.

In January I had the opportunity to sit down with Commissioner Josina Morita in Skokie. During an amazing breakfast at Alexander's (I strongly suggest the Churro French Toast), I mentioned a draft resolution celebrating Cook County agriculture. Commissioner
Morita didn't miss a beat, she
was on board and confident. We
talked briefly about co-sponsors. Allies. And opportunities
to go beyond a simple, positive
resolution.

Shortly thereafter, Farm Bureau's legislative publication carried a brief article about the resolution and asking for sponsors. Commissioner Scott Britton immediately reached out and asked for a copy of the resolution and to be added as a sponsor. Commissioner Britton grew up on his family farm in Central Illinois and remains an outstanding advocate for agriculture.

Joining Britton and Morita as sponsors on the resolution were nine commissioners:
Sean Morrison, Dennis Deer, Bridget Degnen, Bridget Gainer, Brandon Johnson, Donna Miller, Kevin Morrison, Maggie Trevor and Alma Anaya.

Commissioners S. Morrison and Miller, along with Commissioner Monica Gordon, represent most of Cook County's farmland.

Commissioner Johnson is now Mayor Johnson, and we wish him the best at the helm of the City of Chicago. Commissioner Anaya has a reputation for supporting pro-agriculture, pro-food access initiatives while Commissioner Degnen's record on environmental issues is unparalleled. Commissioner Deer's efforts in mental health and on the Health and Hospitals Committee make him an outstanding advocate for mental

health issues and especially for Cook County youth. Commissioner Trevor is one of the newest members of the board. She brings a wealth of knowledge, especially in the area of the environment and natural resources. Commissioner K. Morrison joined the Cook County Board at 28, making him the youngest in history. His record on small business development is unmatched.

The Cook County Land Bank Authority was created in 2013 to address Cook County's inventory of vacant residential, industrial and commercial property. The land bank was spearheaded by Commissioner Gainer.

The above commissioners lent their knowledge. Enthusiasm. And support to Resolution 23-1426, which recognized and celebrated Cook County agriculture – conventional, specialty, livestock and urban. This resolution is just a first step and we're looking forward to the journey and our tremendous partners, the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

Soil Testing Kits

Available This Spring

Cook County Farm Bureau offers both members and non-members an opportunity to test their garden or lawn soil by purchasing a soil testing kit. Soil, in its natural state, is rarely fertile enough for the best growth of plants. Usually, it is necessary to supplement the earth's store of plant nutrients before we can obtain the most vigorous lawn, the most abundant and brilliant flowers, the most aesthetically satisfying trees/shrubs, and the greatest yield of tasty and nutritious vegetables or crops. Test your soil pH, potassium, phosphorous, and other key elements to begin the soil improvement process.

Complete kit guidelines and instructions, as well as mailing information, included in the test kit. Members will receive test results and basic recommendations typically within two weeks, with more extensive test interpretation provided by the partnering volunteer Master Gardener Unit with the University of IL Extension South Suburban Horticulture Team.

This month **"P"**



The passion fruit is a pepo, a type of berry, round to oval, with a soft to firm, juicy interior filled with numerous seeds.

It is native to southern Brazil through Paraguay and northern Argentina.



The passion fruit vine can grow in a variety of soil environments. The vine itself is strong, woody, and can climb up to 4.5 meters (15 feet) long.

Most commonly purplish-brown, other varieties make their appearance varying from gold to orange to reddish.

A good source of vitamin C, one passion fruit has about 15 calories.

Passion fruit can used to make juice or is eaten raw with chilli powder and lime. It also makes a good topping for ice cream, cakes, tarts, pavlova; we're good in fruit salads,

Conceal and Carry Class
