In celebration of the healthy and nutritious food grown and raised by local farmers, Cook County Farm Bureau® members and partners are supporting local families and food pantries.

The year 2024 marks the 24th anniversary of Food Checkout Day and Cook County Farm Bureau's latest effort to support local families in need. Rather than supporting a single charity, Farm Bureau will partner with four local Cook County pantries.

Farm Bureau members who wish to donate to a local food pantry in celebration of Food Checkout Day are asked to complete the form on **Page 2** and to designate which of the partner food pantries that their donation is for.

All four partner food pantries were selected by our partners at COUNTRY Financial.

**Common Pantry** on the north side of Chicago serves nearly 600 households per month. For the past 55 years, the Common Pantry has met the emergency needs of the local community by providing healthy food, kinship, and support to help overcome poverty-related challenges. The Common Pantry strives to provide balanced, nutritious food to the families they serve. Common Pantry was selected by Chicago North COUNTRY Financial Representatives.

**Tinley Park Food Pantry** in Tinley Park serves residents of the Tinley Park and Orland Hills communities. Since 1982, the Tinley Park Food Pantry has been providing a weekly food distribution to families in need, as well as a monthly delivery to the Brementowne Manor, a senior retirement community. Tinley Park Food Pantry was selected by Orland Park COUNTRY Financial representatives.

Schaumburg Barn in Schaumburg serves as a second home for many of the area's seniors and individuals with disabilities. Committed to good nutrition, the Barn offers nutritious and affordable meals. The Barn partners with the Community Nutrition Network to provide daily hot lunches and an older adult market. Schaumburg Barn was selected by Chicago Northwest COUNTRY Financial Representatives.

Share Food Share Love in Brookfield provides food assistance to residents of 15 villages in western Cook County. Like many other pantries, Share Food Share Love experienced exponential growth in need during the COVID-19 pandemic and that need continues to linger, especially as the pantry's service area continues to expand. Share Food Share Love was selected by Chicago South COUNTRY Financial representatives.

# "How about a slogan for 2024?"

Each and every January, my least favorite responsibility of the job is employee evaluation and reviews. It's certainly not because we have any major staff issues. In fact, I would put Cook County Farm Bureau staff up against any staff. They are outstanding!

The process requires "judgment". Most people don't want to be judged. I get it. I don't like judging nor being judged (I know "Good looks and athletic body" were already taken).

And yet, evaluations and reviews are part of the job. And, on the positive side, together each employee and I create objectives, strengthen teamwork, focus on key elements, and reward success. I always want to provide guidance. encouragement, and advice with the intention of making the upcoming year better for our members.

I want to switch gears to help memorialize a friend and leader of the Cook County Farm Bureau...Jim Gutzmer. President Gutzmer passed away suddenly on December 30. It is difficult to describe in words the impact someone makes on others and upon an organization. I will try.

I first met Jim Gutzmer when his name was floated as a candidate for new director of the Cook County Farm Bureau in 1999. He was not born a farmer but married into the Hinze truck farming family. From his work on the farm, Jim certainly became a farmer at heart.

Over his 24 years of service on the Cook County Farm Bureau board, Jim served in nearly every capacity within the volunteer structure of the organization. This includes seven years as President in which the organization was recognized with 2 President's awards for most outstanding County Farm Bureau in Illinois and the Liberty Bell for outstanding policy implementation and legislative action. Grunt work or leadership... It didn't matter to Mr. Gutzmer as long as he served members.

Jim spoke passionately with legislators and elected officials about Cook County agriculture. He advocated about quality, affordable food for the public. He enthusiastically promoted ag literacy in the classroom and youth involvement in agricultural careers. He loved Cook County Farm Bureau. He was proud of his Cook County Farm Bureau.

Thank you, Mr. Gutzmer for your leadership quest...now it is time to rest.

# **Spiced Honey Toddy**

Cook DuPage Beekeepers Association, 2023

Before toasting spices, lightly crack with a mortar and pestle, or on a cutting board by tapping with the end of a rolling pin. Toast allspice, pink peppercorns and cinnamon bark in an ungreased pan/skillet on low heat until aromatic, about 2-3 minutes. Pour filtered water directly into pan over toasted spices and bring to a simmer over medium heat; simmer for 5 minutes. Add chamomile flowers or tea bag and steep for five minutes. Combine buckwheat honey and rum in mug, strain spiced chamomile tea and pour into mug containing buckwheat honey and rum; stir to combine. Garnish with a cinnamon stick, if desired. YIELD: Makes 1 cocktail

#### **Support for farmers**

Cook County Farm Bureau continues to support farmers through marketing enhancement programs like Live Local, Shop Local which offers farmers the opportunity to connect their farm business with local consumers while allowing consumers access to

diverse local food and agricultural businesses located in their backyard.

Another consumer facing tool is Farm Bureau's Local Farm Products website search function. Through this tool, farm businesses are able to register their business and provide information on the products they have available for purchase. Common products include vegetables, flowers, honey, hay, straw, and pumpkins.

Both resources are designed to connect farmers to consumers and consumers to local produce.

Chicago North, Chicago South, Chicago Northwest, and Orland Park COUNTRY Financial® representatives selected the partner food pantries.

### **Agricultural Scholarships**

In 2023, the Cook County Farm Bureau® Foundation awarded \$11,000 to four students pursuing an agriculture-related degree. The scholarship program is designed to provide college students pursuing a degree in agriculture, agribusiness, or agriculture-related course of study. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of scholastic ability and financial need.

### Conservation and the Environment

Farm Bureau understands the importance of pollinators to our food system and ecosystem. Farm Bureau leaders designed a multi-faceted polli-

nator project to communicate farmers' efforts to preserve and increase pollinator habitat as well as to illustrate the connection between pollinators and our food system to urban consumers. This project included the creation of a community pollinator garden at the Farm Bureau building, community presentations, and a large-scale community education event hosted in conjunction with the Lincoln Park Zoo in Chicago.

This project impacted over 200 individuals while engaging 13 Farm Bureau and 18 community volunteers and eight community partners. Community partners included for-profit businesses, associations, local greenhouses, and a major zoological society.

In addition to community outreach, Farm Bureau offered a springtime pollinator seed sale for individuals interested in creating, preserving and restoring pollinator habitat. In collaboration with Illinois Farm Bureau® and Growmark, Cook County Farm Bureau was able to offer one-pound seed bags at a discounted price.

# **Chicago Farmer, Veteran Honored for Inspiration**

A retired Marine, who turned a patch of contaminated Chicago dirt into a place to grow beautiful sunflowers, was named the 2024 Illinois Farmer Veteran of the Year.

Steve Archer was called inspirational at the Farmer Veteran Coalition of Illinois annual meeting at the Everything Local Conference in Springfield Jan. 17. The annual event was organized and sponsored by the Illinois Specialty Growers Association, Illinois Farm Bureau and the Illinois Farmers Market Association.

The disabled veteran stood proudly with his walking stick in one hand and holding the metal sign that recognizes his achievements. He shared the honor with his father, Leslie Archer, an Army veteran who had served in Germany when the Berlin Wall was being built in 1961

Last year, Steve lost his brother and a son, Sgt. Leslie Archer III, who served in Vietnam. He died of post-traumatic stress disorder, his brother said.

"The most important thing is, I need to find a purpose," Steve Archer explained in a written statement that was read at the ceremony. "We wrote a blank check to our country. We will go where you send us," he said. The challenge came of how to continue to serve when they returned home, he explained.

Steve Archer found his purpose in restoring family land and volunteer teaching at a Montessori school. He teaches children not to be afraid of bees. "You are not a flower," he tells them. And, that eggs come from chickens, not Whole Foods.

"That is my purpose," he said.

The first thing he grew, at age 11, was a pumpkin from seed in the harsh soil of his backyard in Chicago.

The father of four, including twins, continues to grow things at Archer Urban Farms and to raise honeybees. Building on the work ethic and morals he said his family taught him, he grows nutrient rich food to give away, and to teach children about food.

Archer, who holds a degree in English and has a heart for teaching, taught children in a nearby Montessori school about farming with chickens, a donkey and a horse. He volunteers when his health allowed it.

"I found my tribe," he said.

The eighth of an acre of Chicago land Archer farms was first farmed by his great uncle. Stories about his father's childhood memories inspired Steve.

At first, he couldn't grow anything on the contaminated Chicago soil.

He told FarmWeek, he is a believer that you don't "lose" from an experience when you didn't win – "you learn."

One option was to restore the soil slowly, building it up by adding organic matter over time. But through a grant, and the help of his sister, and others, he was able to remove the top eight inches of topsoil. It was next covered with Mirafi, a cloth engineered as a barrier to prevent chemicals from seeping water up and water to pass down through. Wood chips and topsoil, also donated, were layered on to make the urban land productive again.

"All things fell into place," he said. Even with the challenge of drought, he produced sunflowers, and grew sweet potatoes to give away.

Zaelon Rohwedder, a Navy veteran who made the award presentation, announced that in recognition of the loss of the horse at the Montessori school, he is donating two pasture pigs from his farm, Shortlegs & Eggs in Altamont. He will deliver the gift to



# IAA Foundation Offers Scholarships to Support Agriculture, IFB Families

More than \$192,000 in scholarships are available for agriculture students through the IAA Foundation.

"We are once again pleased to offer a scholarship program that encourages students to explore degrees in agriculture related fields," said Jennifer Smith, IAA Foundation development manager. "It is imperative that the next generation of agriculture leaders receives the financial support they need to stay immersed in their education and build their career in agriculture."

Agriculture students and Illinois Farm Bureau® (IFB) members, spouses and children are eligible to apply for 110 college scholarships offered by the IAA Foundation, Illinois Farm Bureau's charitable arm. The scholarships, ranging from \$1,000 to \$7,500, will be awarded in total of \$192,001 for the 2024-25 school year.

Applications are open for a variety of financial awards including the newly created Promoting Careers in Agriculture Scholarship, Robert E. Koeller Scholarship and the Allen and Ellen M. Blessman Scholarship. Additionally, the IAA Foundation



offers scholarships on behalf of Prairie Farms Dairy and several family scholarships established to honor loved ones. Fellowships are also available to support students pursuing advanced degrees in fields that directly relate to agriculture.

Scholarships are awarded based on involvement in extra-curricular activities, community service, academic performance, leadership experiences and an essay. Previous winners of an IAA Foundation scholarship are eligible to apply again if the individual scholarship allows.

# **Wheeling Park District Preschool Program**

On Jan. 16 and 17, Director of Ag Literacy Katrina Milton taught 76 preschool students from Wheeling Park District Preschool how agriculture helps keep them warm in winter with sheep's wool and cotton. # Farms Need Licensed Truckers

CDL? 10-4.

That three-letter acronym for Commercial Driver's License also stands for one of my biggest life achievements. Until two years ago, I had no idea how to drive a stick shift. Not even in a car. But our family farm needed more truck drivers, and I wanted to contribute. I stood determined to drive a 10-speed-transmission semi and learn to double clutch while mindful of a 42-foot-long trailer behind me.

Semis arrived on our farm about 30 years ago, a need driven by greater crop productivity, bigger farm equipment and the desire for efficiency. Today, we require people with this licensed skill in the spring to deliver seed and fertilizer to planters in the field, in the summer to get product to the sprayer, in the fall to move grain from field to storage, and another nine months of the year to haul grain to market.

Given my serious lack of experience, I must credit the patience of six men with licenses on the farm who encouraged and helped me earn a full-fledged CDL about 14 months ago. Poor Kent on the first day I attempted to learn straight-line backing, and poor Dale, who witnessed me crawl a hill in first gear from a standstill while fully loaded.

With the help of YouTube and excessive amounts of practice with

members of our farm team riding shotgun, I passed all the required tests: the three written exams, the detailed under-hood inspection, the skills course, and the drive. Per test requirements, I parallelparked the semi and grain trailer, successfully putting all 18 wheels inside the lines from the driver's side. (Just in case I ever need to parallel park on a one-way street.) I aced offset backing with no pullups on my second skills course attempt, and afterward drove the city streets and interstate without missing a gear. Whew.

Most importantly, I gained empathy and respect for our team and other men and women who have mastered the skill. I now drive my minivan differently, understanding the risks that drivers of passenger vehicles can create in their sudden stops, haphazard lane changes and merges without consideration. All drivers should take a written CDL exam, if nothing more than to learn the length a semi needs to stop. To that, I would expect a loud and clear 10-4.

# Americans Were Projected to Eat 1.45 Billion Chicken Wings During Super Bowl

The National Chicken Council (NCC) released its annual Chicken Wing Report, projecting Americans to consume a record-breaking 1.45 billion chicken wings during Super Bowl weekend. This figure represents an increase of two percent from last year's report, the equivalent of 84 million more wings.

So how do 1.45 billion chicken wings stack up? Picture this:

- 45 billion wings laid end to end would stretch from GEHA Field at Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City, Mo. to Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia, Pa. about 62 times.
- Enough to give four wings each to every man, woman and child in the United States.
- Phoenix's State Farm Stadium (home of Super Bowl LVII) holdS 73,000

people. If 1.45 billion chicken wings were distributed to the full stadium, each fan could enjoy 19,863 wings.

 Assuming Kansas City Chiefs' coach Andy Reid can eat three wings per minute, it would take him more than 900 years to eat 1.45 billion wings.

### **Buffalo Chicken Wing History**

Deep-fried chicken wings have long been a staple of Southern cooking. But the concept of cooking wings in peppery hot sauce was born in 1964 at the Anchor Bar in Buffalo, New York, when co-owner Teressa Bellissimo cooked leftover wings in hot sauce as a late-night snack for her son and his friends. The

guys liked them so much that the Bellissimos put them on the menu the next day. Served with celery slices and bleu cheese sauce, "Buffalo Wings" were an instant hit.

Dick Winger, who sold hot sauce to the bar, went on the road with Dominic Bellissimo, the owners' son, to promote the item and sell hot sauce, and the item gradually caught on with restaurant operators around the country. The concept hit the big time in 1990, when McDonald's began selling Mighty Wings at some of its restaurants. KFC rolled out Hot Wings a year later, and Domino's Pizza introduced its own wings in 1994. They've remained hot ever since. McDonald's was back in the wing business in 2013, and its Mighty Wings were featured nationwide at most restaurants through the first quarter of 2014.

### Chicken wings and football – A love story

The rise of the chicken wing and its correlation to American football all had to do with timing.

Cooking the whole bird was trendy in the 1960s and 1970s, but in the 1980s,

U.S. consumers started preferring boneless-skinless breast meat, and wings became an inexpensive byproduct for chicken producers. Restaurants and bars realized they could charge low prices for the relatively inexpensive protein, and due to the spicy/salty nature of the sauce, they discovered that beer sales would go through the roof when customers ate wings.

# Farm Bureau Leaders set State Legislative Priorities

The Farm Bureau Board of Directors established the 2024 State Legislative Priorities at the December Board Meeting.

State Legislative Priorities for 2024 are as follows:

- Estate Tax: To keep family farms together, reform the Illinois Estate Tax to reflect modern farm estate values to ensure farm estates that produce a typical Illinois income are not subject to the estate tax.
- Eminent Domain: Advocate to repeal eminent domain authority allowed for CO2 pipelines under current law.
- Agritourism Tax Credit: Extend the agritourism tax credit against liability

insurance costs that sunsets after the 2023 tax year.

- Navigable Water: Advocate against legislation that grants public access to private waters, as this is a violation of private property rights.
- **Biofuels:** Engage in conversations to promote the use of biofuels as a mechanism to reduce the transportation sector's carbon footprint.
- Private Property Protection:

Advocate for balancing the protection of private property rights with the appropriate development of projects impacting farmland, especially as demand for renewable energy and carbon capture projects increase.

Maintain eminent domain authority specifically for public utilities only. Eminent domain authority should not be expanded to private, for-profit wind, solar, and energy developers. These types of developers, by definition, do not have a public responsibility, but rather only a fiduciary responsibility to their ownership.

• Agricultural Funding: Work to maintain adequate State funding for key Illinois Department of Agriculture programs like meat/poultry/egg inspectors, environmental programs, warehouse oversight, and veterinarian programs. This includes advocating for a viable and independent Illinois Department of Agriculture.

#### • Livestock Management Facilities

**Act:** Maintain a balanced process for siting livestock farms through the Livestock Management Facilities Act (LMFA) that protects both the environment and farmers' ability to raise livestock.

• Nuisance Deer Population

Management: Advocate to reform

Illinois Department of Natural


Resources' deer management policies

to allow farmers the ability to better

manage nuisance deer that cause

damage to their operations.

Updates regarding priorities and legislation Farm Bureau is working on will be provided throughout the legislative session.



# Bill Would Require Artificial Sweetener Labeling

Members of Congress have introduced the TRUTH in Labeling Act – short for Transparency, Readability, Understandability, Truth, and Helpfulness - that would direct the Food and Drug Administration to develop new front-of-package labels for foods and beverages sold in the U.S.

Rep. Jan Schakowsky (D-IL) and Sen. Richard Blumenthal (D-CT) said the bill ensures foods have clear front-of-package labels that highlight high levels of nutrients of high concern such as salt, sugar, and saturated fat.

Sugar Association CEO Courtney Gaine called the legislation's requirement for monitoring of artificial sweeteners encouraging, since there are currently no such disclosure requirements.

Gaine told Agri-Pulse, "While evidence shows that front-of-

pack labeling has not improved health in countries like Chile where it has been implemented, the Sugar Association supports transparency for consumers with regard to calories and all ingredients, including sugar and artificial sweeteners."

The bill is backed by about 20 advocacy groups, including the Center for Science in the Public Interest and Consumer Federation of America. Separately, FDA has already solicited comments and begun consumer testing for different package designs.

Cook County Farm Bureau voting members will be asked their thoughts on food labeling as part of this year's Viewpoint Survey. The Governmental Affairs Committee will use the feedback from members to craft proposed policy changes.

### **XOCONOSTLE CACTUS FRUIT**



Xoconostle cactus fruit is native to Central Mexico, and has likely been used for thousands of years by the indigenous peoples of Mexico.

The small fruit is 5 to 7 centimeters long and around 4 to 5 centimeters in diameter.

Xoconostle (pronounced choko-nose-leh) cactus fruit is a sour prickly pear variety.



The flavor is described as complex with a sour tang and an acidic finish. It lends a sour flavor to sauces and salsas, as well as the traditional mole sauce.

The antioxidant properties of the Xoconostle seeds (where the red pigment is concentrated) are believed to be higher than that of raspberries, red plums and


